Molded window cap -

a carved or shaped band of wood sitting on top of the window frame. It can be located on the inside or outside of the home.

Mitered corners -

two 45 degree angles joined to form a corner that creates a 90 degree angle.

Closed pediment

- a decorative element inspired by Classical Greek and Roman architecture that is found above doors and sometimes windows. They may be triangular in shape as shown here, or curved. They may also be closed, as shown here, or segmented or broken.

Encased timber framing

- notice the timber
encased, or enclosed, in green
painted woodwork on the ceiling.

Plastered ceiling -

a soft mixture of lime

with sand or cement and water for spreading on walls, ceilings, or other structures to form a smooth hard surface when dried.

Paneled wall -

a wall covered with a rigid surface, many times wood that has been decorated with lined sections within each wall or area.

Paneled door - a door

constructed with panels,
usually shaped to a pattern,
installed between the stiles
and rails that form the
outside frame of the door.

Point to the stiles and rails
on this door.

Balusters -

repeat columns of vertical
wood that serve as support for the handrail
on the staircase.

These were hand-shaped by a joiner.
They have a base, a shaft, and a cap.
